Methodology

This tracking poll was designed and directed by SocialSphere, Inc. and conducted by landline and cell phone between August 10 and August 12 and August 17 and August 19, 2014 among a random sample of N=605 likely, registered voters in Massachusetts (including n=358 with likely voters in the Democratic primary). The margin of error for the total sample is \pm 4.0 points at the 95% confidence interval and \pm 5.2 points for the Democratic primary match-up. Sampling and data collection (live interviewing) was performed by American Directions Group.
